Enrollment: Enrollment: Co-education, 1,713 cadets, 61 percent from Virginia, 39 percent from out of state. Cadets come from 45 states and from six foreign countries.

Majors: B.S. degrees awarded in applied mathematics, biology, chemistry, civil engineering, computer science, electrical and computer engineering, mechanical engineering, physics, and psychology. B.A. degrees awarded in biology, chemistry, economics and business, English, history, international studies, and modern languages and cultures. Special programs include honors, undergraduate research, international programs, and writing.

ROTC: All cadets are required to participate in one of the four (Army, Marines, Navy or Air Force) ROTC programs. Commissioning is encouraged but optional; on average, about 50 percent of each graduating class pursues commissions.

Faculty: 98 percent of teaching faculty members have a Ph.D. or terminal degree in their field; approximately 11.7:1 cadet-to-faculty ratio.

Accreditation: Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS); engineering and computer science is ABET accredited; chemistry is accredited by the ACS; economics and business is AACSB-I accredited. The VMI Museum is accredited by the American Association of Museums.

Semester Calendar: Fall semester is from late August to mid-December; spring semester is from mid-January to mid-May. Two summer terms.

Cadet Life: The honor code and the traditions and rules of the Institute regulate the daily lives of cadets. Cadets live in barracks, eat together, and wear the traditional cadet uniforms. Cadets take the VMI fitness test every semester. Cadet rights, privileges, and responsibilities depend on the class system. Several committees run the VMI cadet government and together handle issues of the Corps and enforce Institute regulations. The regimental system is the military component of the Corps of Cadets – nine rifle companies plus the regimental band company. About 60 clubs, club sports, and extracurricular organizations provide a wide range of activities for cadets.

Intercollegiate Athletics: NCAA Division 1 (FCS in football); participates primarily in the Southern Conference. Fields 18 teams: 11 men's and seven women's. Thirty percent of the Corps of Cadets participates in intercollegiate sports.

Library Resources: 280,000 volumes of printed materials and 144,000 government publications; more than 170 scientific, literary, and general interest print journals; more than 50,000 full-text electronic journals; and more than 100 full-text and citation databases; access to more than 200,000 ebooks. Study resources include 118 carrels, six group study rooms, and numerous large study tables. Wireless access to the internet is available throughout the library.

Technology: The VMI post is 100-percent network wired and all academic buildings and barracks have wireless coverage. More than 95 percent of cadets own a computer and 200 computers are available in labs across post. Help Desk services, cadet-owned computer repair, printing, copying, internet access, and MS Office, MS Windows, Mathcad, and Matlab software are provided at no additional cost. VMI does not assess a technology fee.

Financial Aid

Awarded to more than 83 percent of cadets. The percentage of cadets receiving need-based financial aid is 52 percent. Average aid package (including student loans) is \$17,430. The average indebtedness of most recent graduates is \$20,932. Fifty-six percent of cadets graduate with educational loans. VMI strives to meet 100 percent of need for Virginia cadets (including loans) and approximately 70 percent of need for non-Virginia cadets (including loans).
